Listening comprehension:

Can properly understand question words.

Reading comprehension:

Can understand a text of 100-150 words connected to the given topics, informal e-mails and dialogues that contain simple language.

Speaking:

Can introduce himself/herself and his/her family, can name common occupations.

Can speak about his/her studies in a few sentences.

Can speak about his/her weekly routine in simple sentences using time expressions. Can give his/her opinion in simple utterances about fixtures and fittings, human

characteristics, jobs, life in a town and in the countryside or transportation.

Writing:

Can give his/her personal data, write an informal letter of 80-100 words about the university or a blog post with simple utterances about his/her own town or village.

Attitude

Shows openness to learn about the cultural background of the target language. Is able to complete a task or solve a problem in cooperation with others. Constantly seeks to develop his/her language skills and general knowledge. Is committed to quality learning and work. Can critically reflect on his/her own performance.

Autonomy and responsibility

Takes responsibility for completing the tasks set by himself/herself or a superior. Carries out the communication tasks in the foreign language at the level of independence that corresponds to the level of the course.

Can effectively cooperate with others in pairs and working groups.
